### 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Kuriakose Elias College is dedicated to cultivating an academically skilled and knowledgeable workforce aligned with the principles of NEP 2020. By embracing a multidisciplinary and holistic educational approach, the college ensures its graduates are well-equipped to contribute meaningfully to society. The institution offers a diverse array of courses, including core, complementary, open, and elective options, fostering interdisciplinary learning in line with the STEM framework of NEP 2020. This prepares students for the rapidly evolving global landscape. Unique course combinations such as Psychology with Statistics, History with Printing and Publishing, Economics with Statistics, Physics with Electronics and Equipment Maintenance, Zoology with Biochemistry, English with Politics, and Commerce with Computer Applications exemplify the college's commitment to inter-disciplinarity. Additionally, UGC-approved NSQF courses and skill development programs enhance student employability. The college publishes "New Numbers and Letters," an annual peerreviewed interdisciplinary academic journal that broadens research perspectives. Regular internships, projects, industrial visits, conferences, and workshops enrich students' learning experiences with a holistic and practical approach. Co-curricular and extracurricular activities under NCC, NSS, Encon Club, IEDC, Women's Forum, and the R&D Cell actively promote community engagement and social responsibility. The recently sanctioned Star College Programme by the Department of Biotechnology emphasizes interdisciplinary UG Science education. Innovation is a core focus, addressed through collaborations with prestigious institutions. National recognition includes "3.5 Star" rating for the IIC. The Mahatma Gandhi University UG (Hon.) program set to implement by academic year 2024-25 envisions multiple entry and exit points, emphasizing society-oriented projects to inspire future students.

#### 16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) envisioned by NEP 2020 allows our students to accumulate credits from various recognized institutions, both within and beyond their primary university, offering flexibility, mobility, and opportunities for personal and academic growth. To implement this, the college has registered with the Mahatma Gandhi University portal to establish a four-year ABC-structured credit management system for our students. The multiple entry and exit options facilitated by ABC enable students to design their own program structures and certifications. The college has organized several seminars and discussions on NEP 2020, in collaboration with NAAC, the Kerala State Higher Education Council, and other institutions, to raise awareness about the policy's various aspects. Three of our students were selected as NEP SAARTHIS by the UGC. These students conducted NEP sensitization programs on campus and organized an orientation session on NEP 2020 for students of a neighbouring higher secondary school, emphasizing the benefits of ABC. Many of our faculty members serve on the Senate, Academic Council, College Development Council, and Boards of Studies for various disciplines, including English, Biochemistry, Botany, Commerce, History, Statistics, Physics, and Psychology. They have actively contributed to the curriculum restructuring process in line with NEP quidelines.

#### 17.Skill development:

The college is dedicated to holistic development through a multidisciplinary approach, promoting a skill-based learning environment. Vocational education is seamlessly integrated into the mainstream curriculum and complemented by soft skills training through various certificate courses. The Centre for Human Resource Development conducts sessions on Group Discussion Techniques, Personality Development, and Interview Skills to enhance students' employability. Life skills are imparted through diverse methods to instill social, moral, and ethical values as an essential part of the educational journey. Student participation in Yoga championships, NSQF courses, vocational training programs, and internships further supports their skill acquisition and career guidance. The IEDC, IIC, and ED clubs play a vital role in fostering an entrepreneurial culture. The Centre

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for Skill Development provides ongoing training in various trades, including hand soldering, circuit making, basic wiring and plumbing, LED bulb manufacturing, hand sanitizer production, soap solutions, decorative art, and food processing. Distinguished alumni and professionals from various fields regularly collaborate with departments to offer vocational training. Additionally, the college provides government-certified tailoring classes to women from neighbouring communities, empowering them to establish a tailoring unit on campus.

### 18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Kuriakose Elias College, guided by its motto Thamasoma Jyotirgamaya, highlights Bharat's rich and diverse culture, traditions, and systems as central to its activities. Students are encouraged to honour the local history and context of the institution, particularly as the college is rooted in the legacy of the first Sanskrit School in South India, established by Renaissance leader and Patron Saint Kuriakose Elias Chavara on Mannanam Hill. Notably, the first Malayalam daily was published from the Mannanam Press in 1887. Inspired by St. Kuriakose Elias's concept of Pidiyari-the notion that education serves society-this aligns with one of NEP's key thrust areas. Emphasis is placed on the arts and crafts of local culture, as reflected in the college's numerous prize-winning entries at the University Youth Festival. The college adheres to the three-language formula to promote multilingualism, a cornerstone of Indian culture. Vayanavaram organized by the language departments and the library, Hindi Divas on September 14 and statutory celebrations and exemplify the "One India" concept, even on a South Indian campus. The restructured curriculum offers innovative courses in Translation and Interpretation, Studies in Museum, Archaeology, Films and Literature within a multidisciplinary framework. Student tours across the country promote the diverse customs, traditions, and knowledge of India and beyond. The college office adheres to the Kerala Government's Bharanabhasha Mathrubhasha slogan, ensuring bilingual or vernacular instructions. The campus, enriched by students from various Indian states such as Lakshadweep, Manipur as well as international students, embodies the ancient Indian ethos of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam.

#### 19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Kuriakose Elias College has embraced Outcome-Based Education (OBE) as a cornerstone of its educational framework, in alignment with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. This adoption

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underscores the college's dedication to enhancing the quality of education through a structured and systematic approach. The publication of an OBE manual marks a significant milestone in this journey, serving as a comprehensive guide for faculty and students. Regularly organized training programs and workshops for faculty focus on familiarizing them with OBE principles, methodologies, and best practices. Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are meticulously defined using Bloom's taxonomy. To enhance student understanding and engagement, COs are communicated at the beginning of each academic program during induction programs and introductory classes. The attainment of COs and their mapping to POs are rigorously assessed using an OBE framework supported by the EMBASE Pro Suit ERP system. The direct assessment method, which includes both internal and external evaluations, ensures that assessments are aligned with OBE guidelines. Question papers are crafted to reflect the defined COs, ensuring a consistent and targeted evaluation of student performance. Benchmarks are set for CO attainment, providing a clear framework for measuring student achievements against predefined targets and evaluating the overall effectiveness of POs. Course instructors ensure that the COs for theory courses, laboratory courses, and projects are aligned with the POs. Through these structured activities, Kuriakose Elias College reaffirms its commitment to delivering high-quality education that prepares students to meet academic and professional challenges effectively.

#### **20.Distance education/online education:**

Kuriakose Elias College has embraced technological advancements to enhance curriculum delivery and assessment, aligning with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The institution provides ICT-enabled classrooms, offering students the flexibility to learn through various digital platforms. The inclusion of audiovideo learning resources like TED talks further enriched the learning environment. Kuriakose Elias College hosted numerous webinars for both teaching staff and students which served as a platform for knowledge exchange and professional development. The college employs an Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system to monitor and record attendance and evaluation reports, offering transparent information on students' academic progress. This system supports efficient management and ensures continuous engagement with students' learning journeys. As a local chapter of SWAYAM/NPTEL, the college encourages students and faculty to enrol in these online courses, ensuring access to high-quality education comparable to traditional classroom programs.

Facilities like the E-learning Centre, KE Media Hub, Language Skills Centre, and Data Science Studio offer access to virtual learning resources. These centres support various learning modes enhancing students' academic experience. The institution and various departments and forums maintain YouTube channels, uploading subject-related content such as the Guild Series and Elaces Notes by the Department of English, as well as video lectures by faculty members. These resources provide additional learning materials, accessible to students anytime, supporting their academic progress. Through these initiatives, Kuriakose Elias College is well-prepared to integrate online and distance education into its curriculum, fostering a resilient and adaptable learning environment in line with NEP 2020.

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The college's curriculum underwent significant enhancements in 2017, particularly in programs like B.A./B.Sc./B.Com., following advocacy from faculty members within the Mahatma Gandhi University Board of Studies. This revamp introduced a mandatory course titled "Environmental Sustainability and Human Rights," featuring innovative modules such as "Human Rights and Environmental Mathematics" and "Environmental Psychology and Human Rights."Complementary courses like "Economies of Environment and Social Sector" and "Environmental Science and Ecotourism" were integrated to raise awareness of environmental challenges and promote sustainable practices. The college actively supports ecofriendly initiatives such as World Environment Day events, sapling distribution, and Plastic-Free Campaigns, emphasizing the interconnectedness of nature and human life.

Furthermore, core subjects like "Gender Studies" and "Cultural Studies" contribute to educating students about gender dynamics and fostering gender equality. Practical initiatives like Women's Day celebrations and community outreach programs translate theoretical knowledge into real-world action. Initiatives like AWAKE by the MSW Department enrich students' understanding of human values through practical engagement.

Our institution adheres the learning levels of the students and organises special programs for slow learners and advanced

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learners. The classification of newly admitted students are done based on a selection test to assess their knowledge and skills and their higher secondary marks to evaluate their academic background and performance. Marks obtained in first internal exams also form a base for classification. Based on the selection slow learners are suggested for remedial coaching and scholar support programs. Bridge courses are offered to students who have changed their academic options at higher secondary level. These courses aim to provide foundational knowledge and skills to help them transition smoothly to their under graduate program. Assessment process involves regular evaluation of students performance after every internal exam in all semesters. The academic progress of the students is discussed with their parents ensuring their support in students learning journey .Advanced learners are given chance to participate in various workshops, quiz competitions and competitions like paper presentations .Slow learners are given special attention to ensure their academic progress and personal growth with the support of their class teachers and mentors. Counselling sessions are organised for the slow learners to address their specific needs and requirements.

Modern education focuses on student-centric approaches, acknowledging that active involvement leads to better learning outcomes. Unlike traditional teacher-centered methods, which primarily involve the transmission of knowledge from teacher to

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student, student-centric strategies emphasize participation, collaboration and critical thinking. This shift includes methodologies like experiential learning, participative learning, and problem-solving, all designed to enhance the learning experience. To foster engagement and development, institutions offer both subject-specific and multidisciplinary programs aligned with the National Education Policy (NEP). Remedial Coaching and Scholar Support Programs are available for slow learners, while Bridge courses help ease the transition from school to college. The Walk with the Scholar (WWS) program supports advanced learners, and postgraduate students have opportunities to engage in research projects at prestigious institutions. Industrial visits and field trips further enhance experiential learning. In addition to traditional teaching, the institution promotes interactive discussions, group activities, and peer-to-peer interactions, encouraging students to express their ideas and perspectives. Assignments, seminars, and group projects stimulate participative learning. Students are encouraged to take part in extracurricular activities, competitions, and research workshops to build problem-solving skills. A strong mentoring system enhances the student-teacher relationship, further improving the educational experience.

#### 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

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The College adheres strictly to the regulations set by Mahatma Gandhi University for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE). Students and parents are well informed about this internal evaluation system during the College level orientation programme (Praarambha) and through the induction programmes at department level. The dates for internal examinations and model examinations are communicated to the students well in advance through the academic calendar given in the College Handbook and University's academic calendar. The internal assessment includes components such as attendance, assignments, seminars and two internal tests. A three tier committee comprising of Principal, Head of the Departments and Class teachers has been established to address the students complaints related to the internal assessments. Model examinations, based on the university question pattern, are conducted before university examinations at the end of each semester along with internal examination following OBE model.Additionally class tests are conducted after the completion of each module. The answer scripts are evaluated and progress of the students are discussed with them and the areas to be improved are also communicated to them. Open house sessions are conducted to discuss the students progress with their parents.

### 2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

The college's internal evaluation grievance redressal mechanism is transparent, time bound and efficient. Answers scripts are evaluated prompltly after the examinations and marks are communicated to the students without delay. Internal marks prepared in accordance with the university guidelines are displayed in Department notice board and shared through the students whatsap groups before being uploaded to the University portal. Students with grievances regarding their marks are given opportunity for improvement upon recommendation by the class teacher. Students are given chance for re-submission of their assignments or retests by the concerned subject teachers. Attendance records are also managed meticuluosly using the EMBASE app, where teachers mark attendance of students for each hour from the class itself. Attendance are also given to common programmes like seminars or training sessions provided to students at College level by

creating an event in the EMBASE app. This system ensures accurate tracking of attendance, which is accessible to both students and their parents through the app. After publication the internals marks are uploaded to the University portal. Additionally hard copies of the marks, duly signed by the class teacher, Head of the Department and Principal are submitted to the University ensuring a comprehensive and reliable process.

Following the completion of the admission process, departments promptly disseminate the syllabus and curriculum pertinent to each discipline, accompanied by orientation sessions for students. These sessions also include discussions on the curriculum, syllabus, programme outcomes, and course outcomes, providing students with a comprehensive understanding of the discipline's breadth and potential avenues for further academic pursuit, including research. In addition, the teachers explain the POs and COs in detail at the beginning of every semester. Moreover, COs of each course is shared to the students by the teacher in charge of the course. Department-level committees for undergraduate, postgraduate, and research programs monitor POs and COs using methods such as internal assessments, seminars, projects, field visits among others. Stakeholders, including teachers, students, and parents, are informed of the assessment process, which maps learning outcomes through the EMBASE ERP portal. Internal exam questions are designed based on Bloom's Taxonomy and mapped to COs. Departments analyze OBE reports and gap analysis results to assess course outcomes and revise POs and COs as needed to enhance curriculum alignment.

The evaluation of the attainment of programme outcome is an important mechanism which provides a yardstick to visualize how far the institution has succeeded in accomplishing its purpose. The college has used outcome-based assessment with the support of EMBASE ERP system . The college ensures the achievement of learning outcomes through various monitoring mechanisms such as comprehensive student feedback, random feedback from students, and inputs from parents and alumni. Academic activities such as seminar presentations, classroom debates, surprise tests, continuous assessments, and university examination results are closely evaluated. Active student involvement in curricular and extracurricular activities, performance in practical sessions and field trips, engagement in undergraduate and postgraduate projects, participation in mock viva and exhibitions conducted on campus are also evaluated. The evaluation process uses internal (20%) and external (80%) assessments to measure Course Outcome attainment. #### INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

### 4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college campus, spanning 6.62 acres, offers a wide range of facilities to support both academic and personal growth. It houses 75 classrooms with Wi-Fi and caters to 15 UG and 11 PG programs.

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The campus also features 4 research centers in Chemistry, Physics, Economics, and Statistics, along with 14 science laboratories, specialized labs for computer science, bioinformatics, and media studies. Key departments like Botany, Chemistry, Physics, and Zoology are part of the DBT Star College Scheme.

Advanced research facilities include a UGC-granted research block with instruments like UV-Vis-NIR spectrophotometers, FT-IR, and GC-FID. The computing infrastructure includes 205 computers, ICT-enabled classrooms, and high-speed internet. The 11,000 sq. ft. library supports 350 students and offers digital tools such as KOHA software and an INFLIBNET subscription.

The campus is eco-friendly, with a 20 KVA solar panel, rainwater harvesting system, biogas plant, and various gardens. Administrative facilities include offices for key staff and Divyangjan-friendly spaces like ramps and washrooms.

The campus also provides hostels for both girls and boys, a canteen, and various student support services such as counseling, cooperative societies, and community engagement centers, ensuring holistic development in a well-equipped, sustainable environment.

Indoor Sports: The Indoor Stadium (905.2 sq. m) features a multipurpose wooden flooring court, supported by a 12-Station Multi-Gym, physical fitness facilities, and a Yoga Practice Area.

#### Cultural Facilities:

Weekly cultural events and active clubs, including the Music and Dance, Drama, Quiz, and Photography Clubs, encourage student participation.

Radio Club runs CMI Management Sargakshetra 89.6 FM.

Cultural Spaces like Chavara Park and the Butterfly Garden host various programs. The Sun Beam Park and Sports Ground are used for activities like Kerala Piravi Rally and Ethnic Day Celebrations.

Auditoriums such as Fr. Ephrem Kalapurackal Auditorium (1000 seats) and Fabian Hall (225 seats) host larger events.

The college also organizes AWAKE, a state-level cultural fest for special school students, ensuring an inclusive environment for all.

The Kuriakose Elias College Library, established in 1964, spans 11,000 sq. ft. and houses 54,334 books covering diverse fields like literature, science, technology, and history. It supports academic progress through a vast collection of periodicals, CDs, and 15 newspapers. The library also provides resources for academic programs such as the Walk With Scholar and Scholar Support initiatives.

The library offers access to over 6,000 e-journals and 199,500+ e-books through the INFLIBNET N-List program, featuring publishers like JSTOR, Cambridge, and Oxford University Press. Additionally, it provides 600,000 e-books via the NDL program and remote access to Mahatma Gandhi University's INFED resources. Automation is

managed through KOHA, an open-source library system, enabling efficient cataloging, circulation, and user-friendly searches.

Facilities include dedicated sections for newspapers, periodicals, references, reprography, and e-resources. Services such as computerized book lending, open access systems, and orientation programs enhance user experience. Reprographic facilities, internet access, and resources like previous years' question papers are available.

The library organizes orientation programs, seminars, and Reader's Week celebrations, ensuring it remains integral to the academic and intellectual development of students and staff. Its commitment to technological advancement and access to cutting-edge resources makes it a vital academic hub.

The college has a well-maintained waste disposal and management mechanism. Solid waste such as paper, plastics, glass, metals, foods, etc is generated by all sorts of routine activities carried out in the college. The Bio-degradable and non-biodegradable waste are collected in separate bins. Waste materials to be recycled are collected separately. The college has installed an incineration unit for the combustion of organic substances in the waste materials. The college has a well-functioning biogas plant and vermicompost unit. Liquid wastes generated in the college are of two types, sewage waste, and Laboratory waste. There is a well-connected drainage system leading to the closed collection tanks in managing the liquid waste. The tanks are regularly cleaned to

avoid stagnation of water. Hazardous chemicals are neutralized before disposal. Electronic goods are put to optimum use; the minor repairs are set right by the staff. The damaged computers are used by the instructor in the practical sessions of Computer Maintenance and Hardware. Apart from this, the electronic and electrical instruments under repair are given to the students during the lab sessions to dismantle and reassemble, which helps application-oriented learning.
