MANNAN

St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara Our Patron Saint & Inspiration

Born on 10th February 1805 in Kainakary, Kerala, St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara embarked on his educational journey at the age of 5 in a local school called 'Kalari.' By the age of 13, he had joined the seminary at Pallipuram for his priestly training. However, tragedy struck when, during his seminary years, an epidemic claimed the lives of his parents and eldest brother. On 29th November 1829, he was ordained as a priest.

St. Chavara was instrumental in establishing two Catholic Religious Congregations - Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI) for men and the Congregation of Mother of Carmel (CMC) for women. These congregations were dedicated to spiritual renewal and the holistic development of society.

Initiating a spiritual movement, St. Chavara founded seven ashrams and a convent across Kerala. He established the first Catholic Sanskrit School, a major seminary, and a printing and publishing house in Mannanam. His vision extended to every church starting a school, providing midday meals and clothing to children from economically

disadvantaged families. St. Chavara also founded the 'Home of Charity' to care for the destitute, the beggars, the uncared-for sick, and the elderly. Additionally, he organized Kerala's first voluntary charitable association for self-help among the needy.

Despite his multifaceted activities, St. Chavara found time to pen numerous literary and spiritual works in both prose and verse. Notably, 'Anastasyayude Rakthasakshyam' stands as the first narrative poem, and 'Nalagamangal' as the initial historical chronicle in Malayalam. His linguistic prowess included mastery of seven languages: Malayalam, Tamil, Sanskrit, Syriac, Latin, Italian, and Portuguese.

Above all, St. Chavara epitomized piety and charity. He lived for 65 years, passing away on 3rd January 1871. The Church officially recognized his sanctity when Pope John Paul II declared him 'Blessed' on 8th February 1986. Subsequently, on 23rd November 2014, Pope Francis canonized Blessed Chavara, declaring him a saint.

St. Chavara serves as the heavenly patron of all CMI and CMC institutions. The influence of St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, the institution's founder, is pervasive at K.E. College. His dedication to education, social service, and spiritual growth forms the bedrock of the college's ethos. The institution seeks to uphold his ideals by providing an environment conducive to academic excellence, moral development, and responsible citizenship. K.E. College strives to honour its patron saint through the cultivation of knowledge and character.

FACETS OF HISTORY

Kuriakose Elias College stands as a testament to a rich tapestry of history, woven with threads of educational, cultural, and spiritual significance. Administered by St. Joseph's Monastery, Mannanam, the Mother House of the CMI Congregation, this institution finds its roots on the picturesque hill where, in 1846, Saint Kuriakose Elias initiated the journey into secular education by establishing the renowned "Sanskrit School."



Mannanam, the sacred ground that houses the college, witnessed historical milestones such as the establishment of the first press of the Catholic Church in India (the third in the state of Kerala) and the publication of the inaugural Malayalam daily, "Nazrani Deepika," in 1887. It also served as the cradle for the first English medium school for Catholics in Kerala, commencing in 1881. Notably, St. Ephrem's High School, one of the pioneering high schools in Kerala, took root in Mannanam in 1885. The town's enduring contributions to culture, education, and spirituality have been steadfast since the inception of the CMI congregation in 1831.

In 1964, K.E. College emerged as a Junior College, dedicated to providing Catholic youth with the benefits of higher education within a congenial Catholic environment. Guided by the ideals of Rev. Fr. Fabian Kalam CMI, the Founder Manager, and the inspirational force behind the college's construction, and Rev. Fr. Papias Mampra CMI, the first Principal, the institution evolved. Affiliated initially to Kerala University, the college attained degree status in 1967 and, since 1983, operates under the jurisdiction of Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam. Over the years, the college has burgeoned into a distinguished hub of knowledge, radiating as a guiding light of enlightenment for the populace of Kerala.

Aims and Objectives

The Carmelites of Mary Immaculate, in their educational apostolate, embrace the love of God and service to humanity, modeled on Jesus Christ and rooted in the Indian heritage. With a commitment to nurturing intellectually competent, morally upright, socially committed, and spiritually inspired individuals, the college continually refines its objectives.

The Prior of St. Joseph's Monastery serves as the Chairman of the Trust and the Manager of the College. The Governing Body, led by the Manager as Chairman and the Principal as Secretary, holds the reins of general management. Comprising members appointed according to the provisions of the Mahatma Gandhi University statutes, the body orchestrates the harmonious administration of the college, ensuring its continued legacy of excellence.



GENERAL GUIDELINES

The following guidelines are issued in order to help the students to conduct themselves courteously in accordance with the highest standards of decorum and behavior.

- i. Every student of the college is obliged to adhere to the rules and regulations, conducting themselves with decency and decorum to foster a peaceful atmosphere conducive to study and maintain discipline on the campus. Violation of these rules will lead to disciplinary action, including suspension or dismissal.
- ii. Class hours are from 09:40 am to 03:40 pm. Punctuality is expected.
- iii. Students should come to attention when the prayer song begins and stand until it concludes, whether in the class or elsewhere on the campus.
- iv. Outsiders are not permitted on the college campus without the Principal's permission, except for parents/guardians. Strict action will be taken against those who bring unauthorized individuals to the campus.
- v. Students must not bring press reporters or media persons to the college premises without the Principal's permission.



- vi. When encountering a teacher within or outside the campus, students should greet them as a mark of respect.
- vii. Permission should be sought from the teacher before entering or leaving a class in session.
- viii. The use of mobile phones on the college campus is strictly prohibited (as per the Government Order GO. No. RT/No.346/5 Higher Edn. dated 01-03-2005), and violations will result in consequences, including confiscation of phones and fines.
- ix. Campus politics, political activism, strikes, slogan shouting, processions, crowding on the campus, and displaying political banners and flags are prohibited on the campus.
- x. Ragging, eve-teasing, smoking, consumption of alcoholic beverages, and the use of narcotic drugs are strictly prohibited. Statutory proceedings will be initiated against those found under the influence of alcohol or drugs on campus.
- xi. Meetings of faculty, staff, or students on the college campus require permission from the Principal.
- xii. Students should refrain from wandering on the campus during free hours or engaging in group activities on the verandas.
- xiii. During free hours, students are encouraged to use the library or engage in meaningful co-curricular activities.
- xiv. Celebrations of any kind should be communicated to the Principal through the Staff Advisor concerned at least 5 working days prior to the event, with the programme details, guests attending, sources of funds, expenditure estimates etc. The discipline committee will monitor and supervise the celebrations in the college.
- xv. Cinematic dances and fashion shows are not permitted on campus.
- xvi. Students are strictly forbidden from entering classrooms other than their designated ones.
- xvii. Students under suspension are not allowed on the college campus.
- xviii. College properties must be handled with utmost care. Do not disfigure the college furniture, walls, doors, or windows with drawings, engravings, or posters. Do not tamper with electrical installations. Any impairment cost to any of the furniture and other items will be dealt with by the imposition of fines and penal actions.
- xix. Students should regularly check their attendance and rectify any mistakes.

- xx. Malpractices in examinations will lead to necessary disciplinary action.
- xxi. Littering on the campus is strictly prohibited.
- xxii. Vehicles of students are not permitted on the campus and must be parked only in designated areas and are to be taken away before 5 pm.
- xxiii. All Catholic students are to attend the Holy Mass in the College Chapel on the first Friday of every month.
- xxiv. Character and conduct must be earned through good behavior. The Principal has the authority to refuse admission, suspend, dismiss, or take punitive action for student misconduct.

Misconduct shall include:

Staying away from classes without sufficient reason, disrespectful behavior towards staff members, provoking students to strike or participate in protests, disorderly behavior in class, organizing tours without the Principal's permission, loitering around the main gate, porch, stairs, and verandas during free hours and causing disturbances to ongoing classes, distributing leaflets or other materials and displaying banners and posters on campus, scribbling offensive, abusive, or obscene words or drawings on black boards or walls, and exerting undue influence on fellow students.

- xxv. First and second-year students must adhere to prescribed uniforms on designated days. All students are expected to dress modestly and decently. Attire such as casual wear, low-waist pants/jeans, torn jeans, colored dhotis, collarless T-shirts, T-shirts with writings/pictures, and short skirts/short tops are not permitted. Additionally, students are prohibited from tucking up dhotis while on campus.
- xxvi. Students must wear their college identity cards visibly, showcasing them when demanded by authorities. Access to college premises, services, and various activities requires the presentation of the identity card. Loss of the card can be rectified by obtaining a duplicate on payment of Rs.200/-. The Identity Card must be surrendered at the time of claiming a refund of caution deposit or issuing of Transfer Certificate/ Qualifying certificates, whichever is earlier.
- xxvii. All types of ragging and eve-teasing are strictly prohibited. Such cases shall be reported immediately to the police.
- xxviii. In the matter of internal discipline, the decision of the Principal shall be final.
- xxix. Students are expected to spend their free hours in the library.



ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

- i. The college follows a day order system and the time table is followed accordingly.
- ii. A working day is divided into two sessions: the forenoon session (FN) of 3 periods and the afternoon session (AN) of 2 periods.
- iii. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period by the member of the teaching staff in charge of the class.
- iv. Students shall occupy their respective seats before attendance is taken. Latecomers should not enter the classroom, nor should any student leave the classroom, without the permission of the member of the teaching staff in charge of the class.
- v. Late-comers may be refused attendance for the period or marked late at the discretion of the teacher.
- vi. Those students participating in curricular, co-curricular or extra-curricular competitions or activities are expected to get prior permission from the Head of the Department. Non-compliance will be considered absence from class.
- vii. No student shall absent himself / herself from class without leave. Application for leave of absence should be made to the Head of the Department, through the class teacher, in the prescribed form not later than the first date of return to the college after the absence. A student who is present can't leave without permission.
- viii. Every application for leave shall be countersigned by the Parent or Guardian as the case may be.
- ix. When leave is required due to illness, for more than 3 consecutive working days, application for the same must be supported by a Medical Certificate.
- x. If absent without leave for one period, a student will lose attendance for the whole session. When the total days of absence in a Semester exceed five, the parent / guardian of the student shall meet the HoD and give satisfactory explanation. This has to be followed for every five days of absence.
- xi. A student absenting himself/herself without leave for more than ten consecutive working days will have his/her name removed from the roll, and he/she may be readmitted only on payment of the admission fee and the College fee dues, if any.
- xii. Absence without leave from any terminal or class examination or from practical work will be taken seriously.

Condonation of Shortage of Attendance

Students must maintain a minimum of 75% average attendance in all courses to be eligible for the University examination. The University may grant condonation for a shortage of attendance, up to a maximum of 10 days per semester, on valid grounds recommended by the Principal. This allowance is limited to twice during the entire duration of the programme and will not be considered for internal assessment. Students participating in University/College union or co-curricular activities may receive attendance credit for their absence, provided they submit participation or attendance certificates, endorsed by the Head of the Department, within one week. Condonation on medical grounds is also permissible upon submission of valid medical certificates. Students who fail to meet the attendance requirement, even with condonation, must repeat the semester with the next batch after obtaining readmission.

PAYMENT OF FEES

- i. Fees are to be paid in a single installment. Special fees will be collected along with the first installment.
- ii. If a student fails to pay the fee on the due date, he/she shall pay a fine of 10/along with the fee on or before the 10th day after the due date. If the fee payment date or 10th day after the due date happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be considered as the 10th day.
- iii. If the fees and fines are not paid before the last opportunity given for payment, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of the college with effect from the date following the expiry of this period and the student will not get the benefit of attendance from the date of removal from the rolls of the college. If the student is to be readmitted, he/she has to apply for the special permission of the Principal and also remit all arrears of fees with a fine. No readmission fee will be realized in such cases of readmission. The readmitted student will get the benefit of attendance only from the date of readmission.
- iv. For inter-collegiate transfers, students are obligated to pay fees for the term at only one college. Proof of payment receipts must be provided. Additionally, special fees and a caution deposit must be paid anew.
- v. Absence with or without leave from the College shall not be an excuse for non-payment of fees at the proper date.
- vii. Partial payment will not be accepted as the fees are to be remitted to the Government Treasury on the prescribed date.
- viii. Students who are admitted for a term to make up for the shortage of attendance for the course the student was undergoing, should pay one-third of the



tuition fees for the year together with full fees and caution deposit at the time of admission. Only the former students of this college will be admitted as term students.

- ix. Students belonging to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes who are bonafide subjects of Kerala State are eligible for full fee concession and stipend. They will have to produce a certificate of nativity and community from a Revenue Officer, not below the rank of a Thahsildar.
- x. On the days fixed for the payment of fees for a particular class, fees from other classes will not be accepted.
- xi. All cash transactions will be closed at 2 pm.
- xii. Filing of application for the End-Semester Examination by the students is allowed only after the settlement of all the outstanding dues to the college.

A. Caution Deposit

- i. Caution Deposit after deduction of dues, if any, will be refunded on the completion of the course of study or when the student leaves the college with a Transfer Certificate.
- ii. It shall be the responsibility of the student to claim the refund of his/her caution deposit in time.
- iii. Claim for refund of caution deposit should be made before the opening of the college after the completion of the course. Amounts that remain unclaimed after two months from the date of the course completion will be forfeited.
- iv. The students should keep in safe custody the receipts issued for remittance of the caution deposit and it should be produced along with the application for refund of the caution deposit. Failure to produce the original receipt is forfeiture of the claim for the refund.

ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES

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i. A student who has paid all dues to the College is entitled to a Transfer Certificate (T.C.) at the end of an academic year or when he/she leaves the college for better courses of study, and if the progress and conduct are good or satisfactory, as stipulated by University regulations.

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- ii. Students desiring to obtain certificates (such as Transfer, Course & Conduct, etc.) must submit a request to the Principal utilizing the designated form provided in the office.
- iii. Each student is required to collect their Transfer Certificate (T.C.) upon completion of their programme. The T.C. will only be issued upon surrendering the identity card.
- iv. A Conduct Certificate is a document that a student has to earn. It is not issued as a matter of right. A Conduct Certificate is issued based on an overall evaluation by the teachers concerned.

EXCURSION AND STUDY TOURS

Excursion and study tours by students are permitted as part of the curricular and co-curricular programme, under the following stipulations.

- i. Only final-year students are allowed to organise study tours/excursions.
- ii. This should be done only with the prior permission of the class teacher, the Head of the Dept. concerned and the Principal. Students are to obtain letters of consent from their parents
- iii. Booking of vehicles and arrangements for stay while on tour should be made only after consultation with the concerned authorities.
- iv. Class Teacher(s) or other teachers deputed by the respective Head of the Dept. should accompany the students.
- v. The maximum number of days for a tour shall be three. However, for Zoology, Botany and Chemistry students, the number of days shall be fixed by the respective departments.
- vi. Any act of indiscipline while on tour shall be considered an act of indiscipline committed on the campus and will attract punitive action.
- vii. As far as possible, study tours shall be conducted during November/ December soon after the semester examinations.
- viii. Each member of the touring party should see that his / her conduct enhances the prestige and reputation of the institution.

COLLEGE LIBRARY

- i. Only staff and students, as registered members, are allowed to use the college library.
- ii. Members are allowed to enter the library only on the production of their authorised/valid identity cards. Without Identity Cards library service will be refused to them.

- iii. Users may swipe their identity card at the gate entry monitoring system.
- iv. The personal belongings should be kept on the shelves for personal effects at the entrance.
- v. Silence must be strictly observed in the library.
- vi. Students shall not exchange books borrowed from the library.
- vii. Students may freely select books from the shelves. But they should be careful in replacing the books so that the books are not misplaced.
- viii. Students will be permitted to take two books on loan at a time. Books in the Reference Section will not be lent out.
- ix. The librarian may recall any book at any time even before the due date.
- x. Students will be responsible for any damage caused to books. Pencil marks, ink-stain etc. made in a book will be treated as damage. When a book is issued to a student, he/she may point out to the librarian or his assistants any damage/ defect noted concerning a book; otherwise, it will be presumed that the book was intact when it was issued.
- xi. If a book is damaged or lost by a student, he/she will have to replace it or pay three times the cost of the book.
- xii. The period of the loan is 14 days. Books may be re-issued for a further period of 14 days if there is no other demand for them. Absence from the college will not be accepted as an excuse for delay in the return of books.
- xiii. Failure to return the book on the due date entails a student to pay a fine of `1.00 per day of delay except for intervening Sundays and public holidays.
- xiv. Each student will be issued two Reader's Tickets. Books can be borrowed against them. Students must ensure that they get back their reader's tickets when they return the books. A sum of ` 25.00 will be charged for the loss of each Reader's Ticket. This does not, however, absolve the holder from the responsibility for books borrowed against tickets lost. Duplicates may be issued 15 days after the report of the loss.
- xv. Students are required to return all library books before 31st March every year. Final-year students shall return their tickets also by that date. Defaulters will be charged the cost of books and a fine of ` 1.00 per day per item for the entire period of delay.

COMMITTEES & CELLS FOR STUDENT WELFARE

Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)

In accordance with the UGC (Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal of Sexual Harassment of Women Employees and Students in Higher Education Institutions) Regulations, 2015, and the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal) Act, 2013, an Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) has been established to address complaints related to sexual harassment within the college. "Sexual harassment" encompasses any unwelcome sexually inclined behavior, whether direct or indirect, and the college maintains a policy of zero tolerance towards such matters.

OBC Cell

The OBC Cell serves as a vital support structure for our OBC staff and students, addressing their academic, social, and administrative needs. It fosters an inclusive environment where OBC students feel welcome and supported, ensuring fair access to educational opportunities through the monitoring of reservation policies in admissions. Additionally, the cell educates OBC students about government and institutional support programs, acting as a primary grievance redressal body for the OBC community.

SC/ST Cell

The SC/ST Cell is dedicated to empowering SC/ST students and integrating them into the college community. It actively works to prevent caste-based discrimination, offering support in managing academic and personal challenges. Through scholarship awareness programmes and counseling services, the cell ensures SC/ST students are informed about available support programmes. Career orientation sessions and grievance resolution are also key functions of the cell, enhancing the overall experience of SC/ST students.

Students' Grievance Redressal Committee

In accordance with UGC Regulations (Redressal of Grievances of Students), 2023, the Students' Grievance Redressal Committee is established to address grievances of



current and prospective students. The committee aims to provide avenues for resolving grievances and ensuring a fair and transparent mechanism for grievance redressal.

Minority Cell

The Minority Cell provides a platform for minority students to voice their concerns and grievances within the college community. It offers tailored support services including counseling, mentorship, and academic assistance. Celebrating diversity through events and workshops, the cell promotes inclusivity and awareness about different cultures. Moreover, it facilitates access to scholarships and financial aid opportunities and organizes career development initiatives to enhance minority students' employability. Anti-Ragging Committee

In accordance with the UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009, an Anti-Ragging Committee has been established in the college to eradicate ragging in all its forms. The Committee's mandate is to prohibit ragging by law, prevent its occurrence by adhering to these Regulations, and punish those who engage in ragging as stipulated in the Regulations and applicable laws. Ragging is defined as any conduct, whether spoken, written, or physical, that has the effect of teasing, treating, or handling any student with rudeness; engaging in rowdy or undisciplined activities that cause or are likely to cause annoyance, hardship, or psychological harm; inducing fear or apprehension in a fresher or junior student; or compelling students to perform acts that cause shame or embarrassment, thereby adversely affecting their physical or psychological well-being. Any violation of these regulations will be dealt with severely. Ragging is a criminal offense and is strictly prohibited within the institution. The college will take stringent action against individuals found guilty of ragging or abetting such behavior.

REGULATIONS FOR THE UG HONOURS PROGRAMMES

(Extract of Rules and Regulations - 2024 Admission onwards)

I. Introduction

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has issued the Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes 2023 (CCFUP) which would provide a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, multiple entry and exit options, and establish three Broad Pathways, (a) 3-year UG Degree, (b) 4-year UG Degree (Honours), and (c) 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research). Adhering to the CCFUP provided by UGC, M.G. University has formulated THE MAHATMA GANDHI UNIVERSITY UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAMMES (HONOURS)

REGULATIONS, 2024 {MGU-UGP (Honours)} under the New Curriculum and Credit Framework, 2024.

II Main Features and Objectives of MGU-UGP

- 1. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is used wherein students have the option to select courses from the prescribed list of courses. The curriculum has been designed based on Outcome Based Education (OBE) practices.
- 2. An exit with a Degree shall be awarded upon successful completion of 133 credits.
- 3. A 4-year UG Degree (Honours) or UG Degree (Honours) with Research in the Discipline shall be awarded to those who complete the UGP with a specific number of Courses with 177 credits.
- The four year UG programme curriculum comprises three broad parts:
 a) Foundation Components, b) Discipline Specific Pathway components (Major/ Minor), and c) Discipline Specific Capstone Components.
- 5. The Foundation component shall consist of a set of General Foundation Courses and a set of Discipline Specific Foundation Courses.
- 6. General Foundation Courses shall be grouped into 4 major baskets as Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), Value Addition Courses (VAC), and Multi-Disciplinary Courses (MDC).
- 7. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) shall be designed specifically to achieve competency in English, other languages as per the student's choice with special emphasis on language and communication skills.
- 8. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) shall be designed to enhance 21st century workplace skills such as creativity, critical thinking, communication, and collaboration.
- 9. Value Addition Courses (VAC) shall be so designed as to empower the students with personality development, perspective building, and self-awareness.
- 10. Multi-Disciplinary Courses (MDC) shall be so designed as to enable the students to broaden their intellectual experience by understanding the conceptual foundations of Science, Social Sciences, Humanities, and Liberal Arts. Students shall not be eligible to take the MDC in the same discipline that they have studied during their +2.
- 11. Discipline Specific Pathway Components (Major/ Minor) shall provide the students with an opportunity to pursue in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline and develop competency in that chosen area, which includes Disci-

pline Specific Core (DSC) courses and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) courses as Major and Minor courses.

- 12. The Advanced Level/ Capstone Level Courses shall be designed in such a manner as to enable students to demonstrate their cumulative knowledge in their main field of study.
- 13. Major components shall be the main focus of study. By selecting a major, the student shall be provided with an opportunity to pursue an in-depth study of a particular discipline. They can select the minor courses from any discipline.
- 14. Students can opt for a change of major at the end of the second semester to any minor discipline or MDC studied among the foundation level courses.
- 15. Course cum Credits Certificate: After the successful completion of a semester as proof for re-entry to another institution this certificate is essential. This will help the learner for preserving the credits in the Academic Bank of Credits.
- 16. The student has the option to register for and attend a course, known as Audit Course, without taking part in the Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and End Semester Evaluation (ESE) of that course and with 75% attendance. The Audit Course will be recorded in the final grade card of the student.
- 17. All students shall undergo Summer Internship or Apprenticeship in a Firm, Industry or Organization; or Training in labs with faculty and researchers or other Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) or Research Institutions.
- 18. The University will provide opportunities for field-based learning/minor projects enabling them to understand the different socio-economic and development-related issues in rural and urban settings.
- Additional Credits will be awarded for those who actively participate in Social Activities, which may include participation in National Service Scheme (NSS), Sports and Games, Arts, participation in University/ College Union related activities (for respective elected/ nominated members), National Cadet Corps (NCC) etc.
- 20. Options will be made available for students to earn credit by completing quality assured remote learning modes, including Online programmes offered on the Study Webs of Active-Learning for Young Aspiring Minds (SWAYAM) or other Online Educational Platforms approved by the competent body/University from time to time.
- 21. The students at the end of second semester may be permitted to change their major programme of study to any course/ institution/ university across the state.



- 22. The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a digital system by the Government of India designed to enhance student mobility among Higher Education Institutions (HEIs). It allows students to accumulate, transfer, and redeem academic credits through an Academic Credit Bank Account (ABA).
- 23. Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) is the mechanism of evaluating the learner by the course faculty at the institutional level.
- 24. End Semester Evaluation (ESE) is the mechanism of evaluating the learner at the end of each semester.
- 25. CCA results will be displayed on college notice boards or digital platforms for two working days before being uploaded to the University portal.
- 26. Student concerns about CCA will be reviewed by advisors, the HoD, course faculty, and the students concerned. Unresolved concerns can be escalated to college-level grievance committees. The Principal or HoD must ensure that concerns are properly addressed. Persistent issues will be referred to the University-level grievance committee with full documentation.
- 27. Students will be offered the opportunity to take breaks during the programme and resume after the break, but the total duration for completing the FYUG programme shall not exceed 7 years.
- 28. Students who wish to complete the undergraduate programmes faster may do so by completing different courses equivalent to the required number of credits and fulfilling all other requirements in N-1 semesters, where N is the number of semesters in the FYUGP.
- 29. Credit Structure: The credit structure in an academic year consists of 200 working days, divided into two semesters of 90 working days each. Each semester includes 10 days for extracurricular activities and 15 days for End Semester Evaluation (ESE) and Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA). Courses are structured as follows:
- One credit hour equals one hour of lecture/tutorial or two hours of lab/practical work per week.
- A semester credit consists of 15 hours of lectures/tutorials or 30 hours of lab/ practical work, plus 30 hours of related activities.
- Courses have a minimum of 2 credits and a maximum of 4 credits.
- Discipline-specific courses are 4 credits, with optional practical components.
- Multi-disciplinary, ability enhancement, value addition, and skill enhancement courses have 3 credits.

- Activities like internships and community service require 60 hours of engagement for one credit.
- Students can earn extra credits beyond degree requirements, with a maximum of 30 credits per semester and 180 credits for a 6-semester program or 240 credits for an 8-semester program.
- 30. 20% syllabus of each course will be prepared by the teacher as 'Teacher Specific Content' and will be evaluated under CCA.
- 31. A student shall be permitted to register for the end-semester evaluation of a specific course to acquire the credits only if he has completed 75% of the prescribed classroom activities in physical, online, or blended modes, including any makeup activities as specified by the course faculty of that particular course.
- 1. Assessment and Evaluation
- i) The assessment shall be a combination of Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and an End Semester Evaluation (ESE).
- ii) 30% weightage shall be given for CCA. The remaining 70% weight shall be for the ESE.
- iii) Teacher Specific Content will be evaluated under CCA.
- iv) CCA will have two subcomponents Formative Assessment (FA) and Summative Assessment (SA). Each of these components will have equal weightage and to be conducted by the course faculty/ course coordinator offering the course. The course faculty may provide options for students to improve their performance through continuous assessment mechanism.
- v) There shall be theory and practical examinations at the end of each semester.
- vi) Regarding evaluation, one credit may be evaluated for 25 marks in a semester; thus, a 4-credit course will be evaluated for 100 marks; 2-credit courses for 50 marks.
- vii) Odd semester examinations will be conducted by the University and will be evaluated at the institution level. However, even semester examinations will be conducted and evaluated by the University itself.
- viii) Individual Learning Plans (ILPs) and/ or specific assessment arrangements may be put in place for differently abled students.

- 2. Practical Examination, Internship and Project Evaluation

- ii) There shall be a CCA of practical courses conducted by the course faculty/ course coordinator.
- iii) Components for the Evaluation of Practical Courses will be 30% for CCA and 70% for ESE. Those who have completed the CCA alone will be permitted to appear for the ESE.

- i) The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) is computed from the grades as a measure of the student's performance in a given semester. The SGPA is based on the grades of the current term, while the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is based on the grades in all courses taken after joining the programme of study.
- ii) Based on the marks obtained, the weighted grade point will be mentioned in the student's grade cards.

CBCS REGULATIONS FOR UG

(Extract of rules and regulations - 2017 Admission onwards)

The duration of U.G. programmes shall be 6 semesters. There shall be two Semesters in an academic year, the "ODD" semester commences in June and on completion, the "EVEN" Semester commences. There shall be a two month vacation during April/May.

Scheme and Syllabus

The U.G. programmes shall include (a) Common Courses I and II, (b) Core Course(s), (c) Complementary/Vocational Courses, and (d) Open Course. There shall be one Choice Based Course (Elective Course) in the sixth semester. In the case of B.Com. Programme there shall be an elective stream from third semester onwards. A separate minimum of 30% marks each for internal and external (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 35% are required for a pass for a course. For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of Grade D is required for all the individual courses. The practical examinations (external/internal) will be conducted only at the end of even semesters for all programmes.

Examinations

The evaluation of each paper shall contain two parts:

- (i) Internal or In-Semester Assessment (ISA)
- (ii) External or End-Semester Assessment (ESA) The internal to external assessment ratio shall be 1:4.

Both internal and external marks are to be rounded to the next integer.

For all papers (theory Θ practical), grades are given on a 7-point scale based on the total percentage of marks, (ISA+ESA) as given below:

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments are to be done from 1st to 4th Semesters. At least one assignment should be done in each semester for all courses.

SEMINAR / VIVA

A student shall present a seminar in the 5th semester for each paper and appear for Viva-voce in the 6th semester for each course.

INTERNAL ASSESSMENT TEST PAPERS

Two test papers are to be conducted in each semester for each course. The evaluations of all components are to be published and are to be acknowledged by the candidates. All documents of internal assessments are to be kept in the college for one year and shall be made available for verification by the University. The responsibility of evaluating the internal assessment is vested on the teacher(s), who teach the course.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION

The external theory examination of all semesters shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester. Students having a minimum of 75% average attendance for all the courses only can register for the examination. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of 2 times during the whole period of the programme may be granted by the University on valid grounds. This condonation shall not be counted for internal assessment. Benefit of attendance may be granted to students attending University/College Union/Co-curricular activities by treating them as present for the days of absence, on production of participation/ attendance certificates, within one week, from competent authorities and endorsed by the Head of the institution.

This is limited to a maximum of 10 days per semester and this benefit shall be considered for internal assessment also. Those students who are not eligible even with the shortage of attendance shall repeat the semester along with the next batch after obtaining readmission.

CREDIT AND SEMESTER SYSTEM FOR PG PROGRAMMES

(Extract of rules and regulations)

These Regulations shall be called Mahatma Gandhi University Regulations (2019) governing postgraduate programmes under the Credit Semester System (MGU- CSS- PG). These regulations shall come into force from the academic year 2019-2020.

Programme Structure

Students shall be admitted into postgraduate programme under the faculties. The programme shall include two types of courses, Program Core (PC) courses and Program Elective (PE) Courses. There shall be a Program Project with a dissertation to be undertaken by all students. The programme will also include assignments, seminars / practical viva etc., if they are specified in the curriculum. There shall be various groups of Programme Elective courses for a programme such as Group A, Group B etc. for the choice of students subject to the availability of faculty and infrastructure in the institution and the selected group shall be the subject of specialization of the programme.

Project Work

Project work shall be completed by working outside the regular teaching hours and carried out under the supervision of a teacher in the department concerned. There should be an internal assessment and external assessment for the project work. The external evaluation of the project work is followed by presentation of work including dissertation and viva-voce.

Assignments

Every student shall submit one assignment as an internal component for every course with weightage one.

Seminar Lectures

Every PG student shall deliver one seminar lecture as an internal component for every course with weightage two. The seminar lecture is expected to train the student in self-study, collection of relevant matters from books and Internet resources, editing, document writing, typing and presentation.



Class Tests

Every student shall undergo at least two class tests as an internal component for every course with weightage one each. The best of two shall be taken for awarding the grade for class tests.

Attendance

- i. The minimum requirement of aggregate attendance during a semester for appearing in the end semester examination shall be 75%. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 15 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of postgraduate programme may be granted by the university.
- ii. If a student represents his/her institution, university, state or nation in sports, NCC, NSS or cultural or any other officially sponsored activities such as college union / university union activities, he/she shall be eligible to claim attendance for the actual number of days participated subject to a maximum of 15 days in a semester based on the specific recommendations of the Head of the Department and Principal of the College concerned.
- iii. A student who does not satisfy the requirements of attendance shall not be permitted to take the end semester examinations.

Examinations

- i. There shall be a university examination at the end of each semester.
- ii. Practical examinations shall be conducted by the university at the end of each semester.
- iii. Project evaluation and viva voce shall be conducted at the end of the programme only. Practical examination, project evaluation and viva voce shall be conducted by two external examiners and one internal examiner.
- iv. End-Semester Examinations: The examinations shall normally be at the end of each semester.
- v. There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration in each lecture-based course and practical course.
- vi. A question paper may contain short answer type/annotation, short essay type questions/problems and long essay type questions. Different types of questions shall have different weightages to quantify their range. Weightage can vary from course to course depending on their comparative importance, but a general pattern may be followed by the Board of Studies.

Evaluation and Grading

The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) internal evaluation and (b) external evaluation. 25% weightage shall be given to internal evaluation and the



remaining 75% to external evaluation and the ratio and weightage between internal and external is 1:3. Both internal and external evaluations shall be carried out using a direct grading system.

Internal Evaluation

The internal evaluation shall be based on a predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars and attendance in respect of theory courses and based on written tests, lab skill/records/viva and attendance in respect of practical courses.

Direct Grading System

Direct Grading System based on a 7-point scale is used to evaluate the performance (External and Internal Examination of students). For all courses (theory & practical) / semester/overall programme Letter grades and GPA/SGPA/CGPA are given on the following scale:

- KPCR Fee Concession All Students who come under the low income category as mentioned below can avail this scholarship. I DC -Rs.1,00,000, I PG - Rs.1,00,000 Applications should be submitted along with attested true copies of S.S.L.C. Book, mark lists and income certificate from the village officer. This is to be renewed every year.
- Labour Welfare Scholarship This is eligible for children of the members of Kerala Labour Welfare Board. The application for this can be obtained from the Labour Welfare Fund Commissioner, Vazhuthakadu, Thiruvananthapuram- 34.



- Fishermen Scholarship This Scholarship is available only for the children of fishermen and fish workers. There is no income limit. Scholarships should be renewed every year. Applications should contain a copy of the S.S.L.C. Book and copies of certificates revealing educational qualifications. The eligible students should get a counter signature on the application from the Fisheries Officer before it is submitted to the college office. The scholarship includes fees benefit, lump sum grant and stipend.
- OBC Education Concession OBC Students with low income are eligible for stipends. Class Income limit IDC- Rs. 1,00,000, I PG Rs. 1,00,000. Income should not exceed Rs. 24,000/- They should obtain the application forms from the college office at the time of admission by showing a physician's certificate revealing the disability. The filled in application forms should be submitted to the college office within 5 days of the commencement of the classes.
- SC and ST Educational Concession This is available for Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe students. They should obtain the application forms from the College office by showing the caste certificate. Filled in applications should be submitted to the college office within 5 days of the starting of the course. The scholarship includes a lump sum grant, stipend and fees concession. This should be renewed every year.

HONORABLE HIGH COURT JUDGEMENT in case No. 1806 of 2017 dtd 19-10-2017 filed by Kuriakose Elias College, Mannanam

Educational Institutions cannot be turned into a political battle ground. In an educational institution, there cannot be politics. Any individual student interested in politics is free to indulge in his interest, but outside the educational institution. These institutions are teaching and learning institutions. The police would be duty bound to give all assistance in the matter so that upon timely interventions, the Dharanas and vandalism is put under control.

Political activities like Dharanas, hunger strikes and other practices like satyagraha have no place in a constitutional democracy, much less in academic institutions. Anyone indulging in the said activities in an educational institution would make himself liable to be expelled and /or rusticated. Educational institutions are meant for imparting education and not politics.

The police should ensure that the orders of this court are not violated and the academic atmospheres in educational institutions are not disturbed. The educational institution cannot be hijacked and be permitted to turn into a political battle field.
